Angélica Reyes - 2021 Honoree | Legacy Award

Why Angelica Inspires Us

During her time as a four year teacher at Santee Education Complex, Ms. Reyes has sponsored the MEChA and Ethic Studies Clubs and is a strong advocate for the Dreamer Movement as she, herself is a Dreamer. Ms. Reyes is taking the lead on teaching Ethnic Studies and leading professional development that incorporates Socio-emotional Learning practices and Cultural Responsive pedagogy across the curriculum. In addition to her work at Santee and advocacy in the community, Ms. Reyes has participated in the UCLA Writing Project and is a recent fellow for the 2021 Michael LaPrade Holocaust Education Institute.

Angélica's Story: What woman in United States History has inspired you the most and why?

Paula Crisostomo, who led the first high school walk-outs in the 60's, put her education at risk for future generations. So many women like her who have risked their lives and their security, and didn't directly benefit for their effort, but I was able to benefit from the work.

Another is Carmelita Torres, migrating each day from Northern Mexico to the U.S. often times sprayed prior to entry with toxic pesticides. She led protests to prohibit and end this de-humanizing practice. She focused on human rights and dignity for Mexicans. I work in a lower income community and the community benefited from healthcare services such as Alta-Med, which was started by Gloria Arellanes, a Brown Berets who saw the need for medical services in the community. Then there's Ruth Bedford, who was part of the Black Panther Party and noticed the need for children in low income areas to be fed. They started the Free Food Program, which my students still benefit from today. If we want to give these students equitable access to school education, they need to be fed. Then we have Silvia Rivera and Alexandria Ocasio Cortex who are fearlessly fighting for the rights of minorities from all segments of the community. Their fearless unwavering determination has pushed me forward to keep going.

What tips would you have for someone to get involved in their communities?

I want people to know that they are so powerful. When I was young I noticed the



issues in my community but questioned myself, as to what an undocumented browngirl could to do to change things? And then I learned history. We have flourished. We have gone unwatered but we have always blossomed. If our ancestors have done so much, then it is our duty to push forward. I want my students to know that if anything, they have the power because it has been done before. It's not until you stand up that change actually happens.

How does it make you feel knowing your are making a difference?

I feel very honored and powerful to be recognized and am encouraged to continue engaging in this work. This confirms that it's working. That we are being noticed by our efforts. There is so much more that our community needs. So with recognition is often fuels others to also join. I'm excited to continue doing the work my students

and our community needs. I would tell my undocumented students that even though we have DACA (Deferred Action of Childhood Arrivals) signed by President Obama, this happened because of the community organizing to find a solution to this issue. We as educators and minorities are still pushing forward. If you can survive your migration story, you can survive the educational system to make sure you have a comfortable life for yourself and your family and doing something that makes you happy.

Dr. Susan Love - 2021 Honoree | Legacy Award

Why Dr. Love Inspires Us

She has dedicated her professional life to ending breast cancer. As Founder and Chief Visionary Officer of Dr. Susan Love Foundation for Breast Cancer Research, she oversees an innovative research program centered on breast cancer cause and prevention. Dr. Love is also a clinical professor of surgery at UCLA's David Geffen School of Medicine. As one of the founders of the National Breast Cancer Coalition, Dr. Love is well known as a trusted guide to women worldwide through the Foundation's ImPatient Science™ education program and her books, including Dr. Susan Love's Breast Book, now in its sixth edition. The Foundation's recent groundbreaking initiatives include the Love Research Army, developed to partner women and scientists to accelerate translational research, and the now closed Health of Women (HOW) Study™, an online cohort study aimed at identifying the cause of breast cancer. Among the Foundation's collaborative research projects are the development of an NIH-funded self-reading ultrasound technology for triage of palpable breast lumps, an analysis of the anatomy of the breast ductal system, and an investigation into the microbiome of the breast ducts.

Dr. Love's Story: What women in United States History has inspired you the most and why?

Elizabeth Blackwell (1821-1910) she was the first woman to graduate from medical school in the United States. She was born in England but raised in the U.S. She was motivated to go to medical school after a dying friend told her that her ordeal would have been so much better if she had a female physician. When she wanted to go to medical school the only college that accepted her was Geneva College, which was initially a joke as no woman had ever entered or been accepted to medical school. She faced segregation because she was socially distanced from the men. Despite this treatment, she graduated number one in her class. Dr. Blackwell never took no for an answer always finding a way to make things better in the medical field. She suggested to her male colleagues that perhaps if they washed their hands, less disease would be spread to patients. She established her own school, the New York Infirmary for Women



and Children to educate more women. She was not afraid of anybody. This is why she has always been my inspiration to figure things out and be a visionary.

What tips would you have for someone to get involved in their communities?

Don't wait to be asked. If you see a problem or see a group that is doing good work jump in and just do it. We spend too much time thinking why it cannot be done but it can always be done. The solution may not be as you envisioned the first time but then you just try it another way. My dad always said that our role in life was to make the world a better place. That has been my motivation throughout my life. We may not be responsible for all the problems but we have a responsibility to try and make them better.

How does it make you feel knowing you are making a difference?

I am humbled and feel as if I'm never doing enough. I went to medical school when there were still quotas to accept women. I went to Harvard and no one offered me a job. The only patients that came to me were women with breast issues. So that's how I got started as a surgeon. I realized how badly women were being treated. No one was giving them the options. This is what really motivated me, so I wrote the first edition of The Breast Book. I had to translate into Spanish myself as no publisher would do so.

Rima Nashashibi - 2021 Honoree | Legacy Award

Why Rima Inspires Us

Rima is the founder and president of Global Hope 365, a 501 (c)3 nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the lives of women and girls, locally and worldwide, by advocating for their safety through raising awareness, education, and empowerment. Her focus is to end harmful practices towards women and girls such as Child Marriage, Human Trafficking, and other forms of Gender-Based Violence.

Rima's Story: What women in United States History has inspired you the most and why?

There are three women who have inspired me. Margaret Mead, who was an American Cultural Anthropologist who was featured frequently in the media during the 1960s and 70s. Mead was a communicator of anthropology in modern America and Western culture and was often controversial as an academic. Another is Shirley Chisholm who was born to immigrant parents, and was an American politician, educator and author. In 1968 she became the first African American woman elected to U.S. Congress. In 1972, she became the first black candidate and woman to seek the nomination for president of the United States from a major party. Unfortunately, the country was not ready for her during that time period. The third person is Mother Teresa, who needs no introduction. These women are pioneers in their own field and I would love to be like them.

What tips would you have for someone to get involved in their communities?

I would encourage others to be very active in their communities by not taking no for an answer. I never did. I never will. I used this philosophy when I ran a division for AIG Risk Management Corporate Accounts. I followed that philosophy then and I follow it now. Do not take no for an answer because there is no way for you to change the world or to change your community, be it climate change, ending child marriage, or ending human trafficking, if you do. Whatever you need to achieve, do



not take no for an answer. Just keep your eye on the target and keep going. They either get on the train or get out!

How does it make you feel knowing you are making a difference?

It makes me feel humbled and emotional. It's humbling when one of the survivors commented, after we won our third resolution of support against child marriages at a city council, that you're my Angel, because she didn't want what happened to her to happen to other girls. Yet all this time I thought that child marriage was not legal in the U.S. until I read an article printed in 2016, written by Nickolas Kristof in the New York Times titled, "11 Year old Mom Pushed to Marry Her Rapist in Florida." By 18 years of age, she finds a friendly Attorney who got her a divorce. By that time she had 7 children. When you hear a 50 year old, talk about her experience when she was forced to get married at 16 and she starts crying, you get emotional. When our own state department issues a report in 2016 stating that child marriage is a fundamental violation of human rights in other countries, well what about our country, our kids! Before we can go police the world we need to take care of our own children. With 248,000 minors, mostly young girls marrying adult males from 2000 to 2015 according the Census Bureau in the United States, we have to say enough is enough. We need to end this and that's what we are trying to do here at Global Hope 365.

Cielo Echegoyen | Rising Star

Why Cielo Inspires Us

Born on February 5, 2003, to immigrant parents, Cielo is passionate about issues facing immigrant communities. Following her father's arrest by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) in June of 2019, Cielo has maintained contact with two detainees at Adelanto ICE Processing Center who have since been released. While detained, her father told her that this will not last forever and that she must remain strong. Teachers helped her family pay their rent during this hard time. She has overcome such hardships during her young life and is an inspiration to us all.

Cielo's professional interest is in cancer; which is a diagnosis her loved ones have been affected by. Her goal is to practice Oncology in the state of California and to relieve health disparities in Latin and Central America. She aspires to open a clinic in rural areas of her parents' respective countries of Mexico and El Salvador. Cielo will be majoring in Molecular and Cellular Biology at Harvard University this upcoming fall.

Cielo's Story: What woman in United States History has inspired you the most and why?

Barbara McClinkock (1902-1992). She was a scientist and cytogeneticist who was awarded the Nobel Prize in Physiology in 1983. She enjoyed boxing and despite her mother's disapproval, decided to pursue her PhD in Science. She taught at Missouri University but was not liked because she wore pants. Despite the environment she remained focused studying maize cytogenetics thought her career. She was able to map genes using corn. During the 1940s and 1950s, Ms. McClintock discovered transposition and used it to demonstrate that genes are responsible for turning physical characteristics on and off. McClintock's research became understood 30 years later as other scientists confirmed the mechanisms of genetic change and protein expression that she had already demonstrated in the 1940s and 1950s. She tolerated so much but one of my favorite quotes from her is "when you are right, you don't care if nobody believes in you."



What tips would you have for someone to get involved in their communities?

If you study change-makers in history there are no definitive rules. However, there are important commonalities;

- Listen. Be willing to Educate Yourself
- Forgive yourself for the mistakes your are bound to make
- Invite others into the conversation so that this conversation of change takes on a life of its own
- Take Care of yourself as taking on such responsibility is exhausting, but THE CAUSE NEEDS YOU.

How does it make you feel knowing you are making a difference?

I didn't expect my dad would be detained, or that I could help others also detained and assist them to get through the process. However, I feel privileged to have helped these individuals providing translation services or finding them legal resources. I recognized that through this experience I could also serve a need in my eventual medical career by becoming a bilingual Oncology doctor in California.

Mayor Robert Garcia | Second Gentleman Award

Why Robert Inspires Us

Not only is Dr. Robert Garcia an amazing man who supports women and minorities, he embodies courage and perseverance. He is an educator and the 28th Mayor of the City of Long Beach. He was re-elected to a second term by almost 80% of the vote in 2018. Mayor Garcia immigrated to the United States at age 5 and was raised in Southern California. The Mayor, a college and university educator, holds an M.A. from the University of Southern California and an Ed.D. in Higher Education from Cal State Long Beach, where he earned his B.A. in Communication. Mayor Garcia is focused on making the City of Long Beach a leader in education, economic development, and climate protection. As Mayor, he has championed progressive education policy, launched an aggressive climate plan, supported workers by increasing the minimum wage and fought to expand and protect rights for women, immigrants and the LGBTQ community. Mayor Garcia currently serves as a Board Member on the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) representing much of South East Los Angeles County. He is married to Matthew Mendez Garcia, a professor of political science at California State University, Long Beach.

Robert's Story: What woman in United States History has inspired you the most and why?

Sonia Sotomayor, Associate Justice fo the Supreme Court of the United States, because she is a strong Latina, justice centered and grew up understanding the struggle of working people. Also, Hilary Clinton because she was a political role model who always supported women's rights. She had to go through a lot just for all of us to get into politics. Then I would say my mom, maybe not as a national historic figure but for me represents a lot of what immigrant women have gone through in the United States.

What tips would you have for someone to get involved in their communities?

I think you should never be afraid of being the first or that you are not part of the establishment. Don't wait for an invitation. I think often times our community especial-



ly communities of color and women, we often wait to be invited and I really believe you have to bring your own chair to the table. You have to be ready to make things a little uncomfortable and push so you can make your own space at the table.

How does it make you feel knowing you are making a difference?

I'm just happy to be able to serve. I think that my experience as an educator always taught me to do the most public good with the time you have. I take all my experience and training from the classroom into public service such as be a good listener, be fair, treat people with respect and know that everyone in your classroom or in your community has something to contribute.

Why Lilly Inspires Us

Lilly challenged a major corporation because it was the right thing to do. In 1979, Lilly was hired by Goodyear Tire and Rubber plant in Gadsden, Alabama. She worked there from 1979 until her retirement in 1998. For most of those years she worked as a line manager, a position largely occupied by men. Initially, her salary was line with that of men in the same position. However, over her tenure her pay slipped in comparison to her male colleagues with equally and even less seniority. By 1997, Lilly was the only woman working as an area manager, but nearing her retirement she learned of this pay discrepancy. Although she successfully sued Goodyear, the judgement was reversed on appeal by he Eleventh Circuit. The suit however reached the Supreme Court, which ruled against her because she did not file the suit within 180 days from the beginning of her employment. In dissent, Justice Ginsburg stated the obvious facts that Lilly experienced pay discrimination. Although she lost, Congress responded later with the passing of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009, that started the 180-day clock every time a discriminatory paycheck was issued.

What Woman in United States History has inspired you the most and why?

Eleanor Roosevelt, because she was way ahead of her time. She worked with the African Americans when it wasn't cool as they say. After traveling to Washington I learned of all they things she did to help women and minorities. She also helped and supported the Suffragists. She was really an inspiration to me. I love to read her books and her history. One of my favorite sayings from Eleanor is, "A women is like a tea bag, you never know how strong it is until it's in hot water."

What tips would you have for someone to get involved in their communities?

Get involved in your community. We must stay involved in our local government, our state and definitely our nation because we never know what they are about to pass into law and how it will affect our lives. Women have so few rights, we cannot afford to give up any. In fact we are still fighting for paycheck fairness. I continue to lobby for this important issue because had that been a law it would have protected me in my



day but it wasn't. We need more changes to the Equal Pay Law and Title VII to help American families. That's why I encourage young people today to stay involved. Read what they're passing, making sure it does not affect your family in a negative way. Each of us have a vote and we can make a difference. One person can start the fight but everybody else can join in and win the battle.

How does it make you feel knowing you are making a difference?


When President Obama signed the Ledbetter Bill, I said to him, do you realize the awesome responsibility this has placed on my shoulders because it was up to me to fight for equal pay? Women do not realize what they are entitled to at the time under the previous Title VII Civil Rights Act of 1964. I did not receive a dime from the

Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. However, there are so many women today that are outliving their spouses on average by ten years and they cannot stay independent simply because they did not get their rightful pay and get to have the retirement that they should have. Pay check fairness will protect women to receive equal pay. Women do not want lawsuits. It took me nine years from the time I filed the charge until I got the fine verdict. Then it took us another 18 months to pass the Lilly Ledbetter Bill but that was glorious time as it was a bipartisan bill that took a lot of work. Just as Ruth Bader Ginsburg challenged Congress with her dissent, stating that this was in Congress' court. It's up to you to change this great injustice for future generations.

very once in a great while an artist comes on the scene for whom there is no category -- no quick one liner that successfully describes his gifts for all to understand. Mark Turnbull is such an artist. If you call him a songwriter, you might miss the fact that he is also a lyricist and composer of musical theatre. If you call him a virtuoso guitarist, you might forget to listen to the beauty and power of his words. If you call him an actor, you might not notice the honesty of his storytelling. If you call him a poet, you might overlook his marriage of poetry with melody.
